

At the heart of our *Time to Rise* campaign has always been the Marquette promise — a commitment to Be The Difference by supporting our mission, our students, and our broader campus, alumni and Marquette communities. No one helped define and live this ongoing promise more than President Mike Lovell. He believed deeply in the power of the Marquette promise and in the campaign's ability to help us deliver that promise for today and tomorrow.

From the campaign's earliest frameworks, President Lovell championed the ways that *Time to Rise* would advance a bright, strategic vision for Marquette, how it would energize our alumni, parents and friends, and what these philanthropic resources would mean for students and faculty. His leadership and enthusiasm carried us through the campaign's quiet phase momentum, our virtual launch in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, and surpassing the university's bold goal of \$750 million with several months remaining.

Through your leadership and energy for Marquette, our rightfully bold *Time to Rise* campaign culminated in the largest philanthropic achievement in university history, surpassing our goal of \$750 million seven months ahead of schedule. In total, \$801.7 million was contributed in new gifts and confirmed pledges. A height of resources and support previously unimagined and one that propels Marquette into our bright future.

Thank you for helping to write this chapter in the story of Marquette. Whether you gave once or several times and whether you walked with us from the beginning or rallied at our close, your support helped to create the robust culture of giving that made *Time to Rise: The Marquette Promise to Be The Difference* a campaign for everyone.

Notably, in the final year of *Time to Rise*, we inspired the most alumni ever to support Marquette in any single fiscal year. That enthusiasm also led us to reach the highest single year total of funds raised at more than \$118 million.






Campaign commitment by category of support




Giving by constituency type








Expand Student Opportunities

Gifts through *Time to Rise* are **making a difference for students now** — with 141 new current-use scholarships and approximately \$10 million a year in current-use scholarship distributed to students in real time — and for the future — with 295 new endowed scholarships and \$231 million in endowed scholarship that will support students in perpetuity.

Success for the journey

In the early years of *Time to Rise*, alumni couple Jim and Kelly McShane had the vision to support students through a leadership gift to create a success center based in the Opus College of Engineering. Today, that vision has not only resulted in more than 1,500 annual student visits to the Engineering Student Success Center, but also helped inspire the university's **broader focus on holistic student success**, from the growth of other college-based success centers to Marquette's now-open central resource hub for all students in the Lemonis Center for Student Success, made possible by the philanthropic leadership of Marcus and Bobbi Lemonis.

A sense of belonging

Time to Rise helped Marquette **expand its full-tuition Urban Scholars program to 45 students annually** and emphasized **support for first-generation students** — whether through scholarships or innovative initiatives like the RISE (Ready to Inspire Success and Excellence) and Encuentros orientations that help Marquette feel like home for our diverse student populations.

Bridging the gap

Hope is brighter for students who encounter financial emergencies during their time on campus thanks to the **extraordinary growth of Marquette's** *Bridge to the Future Fund*. Bridge helps close the tuition gap for students in challenging economic situations — an absolutely vital resource during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Support for Teacher-Scholars

Our teacher-scholars are not only exceptional in helping to develop men and women for others, they also elevate Marquette's global reputation, research discoveries, servant leadership, and prestige among peers. *Time to Rise* helped provide resources for faculty and academic leaders to excel.

- More than **\$185 million raised to support our faculty.**
- More than **118 faculty-focused funds established**, including those that advance faculty research and support graduate assistants.
- Nearly a dozen endowed faculty or directorship positions established or grown.
- Updated academic facilities like O'Brien Hall (Business), Straz Hall (Nursing), green screen technology within Johnston Hall (Communication), the Neuro Recovery Clinic (Health Sciences), the Omron Advanced Automation Lab (Engineering), upgraded dental clinics, Marquette's Athletic and Human Performance Research Center and more.

Foster University Innovation

Because of you, here's how Marquette teacher-scholars across our colleges and professional schools are leading and serving in new ways with immersive learning experiences for students and opportunities to positively impact their fields and communities.

- Advancing technology through the campaignlaunched Northwestern Mutual Data Science Institute in a cross-city collaboration with UWM.
- Meeting the need to train more mental health professionals through an endowed professorship and graduate scholarships.
- Offering incarcerated and formerly incarcerated students an immersive stepping stone toward higher education, learning alongside Marquette students through our Educational Preparedness Program and the McNeely Prison Education Consortium.
- Strengthening students' ability to navigate tough, necessary conversations across differences through our unique Civic Dialogues program.
- Fostering real estate expertise for Catholic, Jesuit higher education through the Vieth Institute for Real Estate Leadership and the Vieth Directorship.
- Empowering investigative journalism through the expansion and full endowment of Marquette's O'Brien Fellowships, which also provide mentoring for student journalists alongside the fellows.

- Serving as a leading venue for intelligent civil discourse about law and public policy matters through the Lubar Center.
- Serving vulnerable and special needs patients through updated clinics and the Delta Dental Clinic for Urgent and Special Care.
- Building the pipeline of dental scholarship and talent for Wisconsin and beyond.


